

Robert and Lois Carr – Missionaries in Kenya



Robert came to Christ in the seventies through the Jesus Movement. He eventually became the pastor of a group of young Jesus People. There he met Lois who grew up in a Christian home and became a Licensed Practical Nurse. They were married in 1976.

In 1984 Robert and Lois joined a team of missionaries working in Uganda with World Harvest Mission. The Carrs served there from 1985-1991 doing church planting.

In 1997 the Carrs began serving in Kenya training African church planters in the Africa Evangelical Presbyterian Church. Churches are being planted among Africans (as well as various unreached Indians) both in the capital of Nairobi and rural areas of the country. Lois helps disciple women in the Indian church and uses her nursing skills to help with the medical needs of children in the slums.

As a regional church planter specialist, Robert trains and coaches church planters in Kenya, Uganda, and soon hopes to be doing this in South Sudan.

Robert and Lois have four children. Rebekah, Jessica, and Stephen are now living in the U.S., and Andrew is still living with them in Nairobi.

Robert has an M.Div. degree from Westminster Theological Seminary and recently received his D.Min. from Columbia International University.

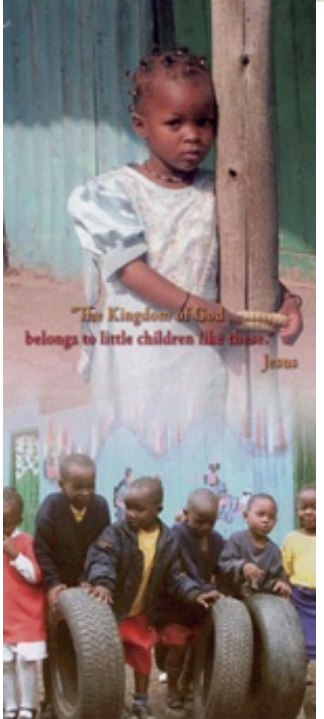

Synopsis



The Kianga Kids project is designed to meet the healthcare and diaconal needs of children in Nairobi, Kenya. 60% of Nairobi's residents live in "urban developments" known better as slums. 20% of those who live in the slums are estimated to be HIV+, and 50% are estimated to be under age 15. The Kianga Kids project will enable the churches and pastors with whom we

partner in Nairobi to use healthcare in their nursery schools and other outreach programs to serve their communities. Our hope is that through this ministry, we will be able share the gospel in a way that shows that Jesus cares about the whole person – physically, intellectually, socially, emotionally, and spiritually. Lois Carr, LPN is a part of World Harvest Mission's Nairobi team whose main task is training church planters in the African Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

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Note: Kianga is a Kiswahili word meaning the brightening of the sky after a storm, or the clearing of the weather.



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
